	to present to you the Chairman's Report, at the 2024 Annual General Meeting.	
	I would like to add my own warm welcome to you all, in particular to our	
	members who have made the journey to be with us today.	
	The annual report is, necessarily, only ever a snapshot of what has been	
	achieved in the course of the year, and so I intend to focus on some of the	
	highlights of the year.	



I took over the chairmanship of the Suffolk Horse Society following the 2023 AGM, from Mark Donsworth, whose three year term had come to an end. Whilst it has been an enjoyable position to hold, the year has been a challenging one.

At the end of May, Jessica Ellis, one of the Society's secretary's decided to move on, and with one member of staff down in the office, the workload has been shared out between Belinda and the officers, Gail, Alan and myself. It has been very busy at times, but it has also given us all a good insight into the running of the office.

I would like to put on record our grateful thanks to Belinda throughout this time. Belinda has been amazing having to man the office on her own, but Gail and Alan and myself have stepped up and taken on the jobs of getting banking done, learning all about assembling and getting the magazines out, hitting deadlines, and sorting the end of year grants out and getting them paid, this with the help from John Fleming our breed committee chairman.

Gail and Alan have been incredible in the time they have had to give to the Society.

Together the officers interviewed candidates to fill the vacant post, and we are very pleased to confirm that at last the office is now fully staffed.

Our new secretary Liz Pardey joined us several weeks ago and I know that all our members will join with me in formally welcoming Liz into the Suffolk Horse Society 'family'.

I would therefore like to briefly reflect on some of the events of the past year:

In the summer, affiliated shows took place, starting with the Suffolk Horse Society Breed Show, at Woodbridge.

We welcomed a new affiliated show to our list in 2023 - The Derbyshire County Show. This saw a nice entry forward from members further afield. Our summer social took place at Jimmy's Farm, and this was a very enjoyable evening, despite the rain, Jimmy's two Suffolk's also put in an appearance.

The Spectacular in September took place at The Food Museum in Stowmarket, this was greatly supported by the horse owning members, from near and far and saw over 40 horses present in the Grand parade. We featured a number of photographs of the day in the recent Spring magazine.

In October the Society held The Foal And Young Stock Show in the walled garden on The Euston Estate. The Young Handler championship was kindly hosted once again at Banham.

The weather put paid to the plough day we had arranged in conjunction with Eastern Counties Heavy Horse Association, but we hope to be able to hold this later this year.

The Annual Awards Dinner was held again at Hintlesham Golf Club in December and was well attended. This year we were delighted with the results of the successful raffle and Auction for the society; I would just like to add here our grateful thanks to all those who so generously donated



items; I know several of us bid competitively for many of the items, and some of us will be heading off to enjoy the Trooping the Colour a little later in the year.

Looking ahead to 2024, in January we embarked upon the Australian Semen Project. The Society has purchased semen from an old Suffolk bloodline in Australia in order to introduce this line back into the gene pool to reduce the inbreeding coefficient of the national herd.

With the quarantine rules in place the stallion was on site for 28 days before collection commenced and the semen had to remain for a further 30 days more after collection, before export of the semen could take place. We had hoped for 50 doses although only 33 doses were collected in the end. The project took advice from Dr Andy Dell, and will see this semen only being offered to a maximum of eight selected mares with the most diverse genes, this year, and we plan to offer doses of semen to five more mares for the following two years. It's a very exciting project and we shall report on the progress as the year progresses.

In March a probationary judge's day was organized by John Fleming with the Suffolk Punch Trust kindly hosting for us. This saw three judges pass through on their way to becoming Suffolk Horse Society Judges.

Paul Smith organized three Society training days: one ridden, one braiding and in hand show preparation, and one driven day. These were all well attended.

I must thank Cherry Grover and Nigel Oakley who are still so very keen and willing to support and promote the Society whenever asked.

This year will see the Suffolk Horse getting back its own ridden heavy horse qualifier meaning the Suffolk Horse will be represented in the final at the Horse of the Year show in October. This Qualifier will take place at the breed show at Woodbridge, on May bank holiday. We hope to see a good entry forward on the day, I am aware that members are kindly doing their best to get entries forward to enable this qualifier to continue.

The Suffolk Horse Society van has attended its first event of the year and will be present at events across the country promoting the breed with Belinda and Russell. Places to see the van are advertised in the magazine, and further updates will be posted on the website and social media.

In 2023 we saw 40 foals born. The Suffolk Horse Society has 8 foals born so far in 2024 - 6 fillies, and 2 colts, and we await the safe arrival of more.

So much of what the Society is able to achieve would not be possible without funding and stable financial backing.

We were fortunate to once again receive a large grant from the Horse Race Betting Leve Board, and recently the Society received a substantial legacy which will enable us to fund the Australian Breeding Project over the next three years.

I am sure I speak on behalf of us all when I say that we are very fortunate to have such a professional and willing treasurer, always on hand to advise and act for us. Thank you Alan for all the help and time you give so willingly to the Society.



I would like to say a special thank Mary Ryder-Davis, for all the hard work she has put into her year as President, and for all the help and advice so willingly given from her invaluable knowledge of the society.

Thanks also to Jayne Groom, who never says no to the Society when catering is needed at an event, and she has even provided refreshments for

the meeting here today.

And to my Vice Chairman Gail, I am not sure where to start to say thank you to her, but my year as Chair has certainly been easier with Gail there, I am not sure how she has time to fit in the Society work load, with all her other jobs, but it is said if you need a job done ask a busy person.

In conclusion, I would like to add that we have embarked upon this year with enthusiasm: we have a competent staff team, we have a committed board of trustees and a thriving membership.

Finally, I wish to conclude by extending sincere thanks to Belinda and Liz in the office, and to you, our members and supporters, who are passionate about our amazing Suffolk horses.

And to my fellow Council members, who give of their time and expertise unstintingly ...and share with me the responsibility, of leading a Society that is so dear to us all.

A sincere thank you to you all.
